## The problem. **Project's solution**

Communities in the Romania-Ukraine border region are increasingly exposed to major risks such as floods, wildfires, and emergencies arising from geopolitical tensions. These threats are intensified by climate change, rugged terrain, and gaps in preparedness, making rapid and coordinated response difficult. To address them, the project invests in modern infrastructure, advanced equipment, and joint training, fostering standardized procedures and stronger cross-border cooperation to ensure effective emergency management and long-term community resilience.

- General public of Chernivtsi oblast and Suceava county
- Professional emergency and police services
- National, regional and local public authorities

## **Project Outcomes**

- Construction of the headquarters for the county committee for emergencies in Suceava
- endowment of IES Suceava (firefighter protective gear used for training)
- endowment of CPI Suceava (two mobile units, forensic tool kits)
- endowment of MDESS Chernivtsi
   (specialized equipment: tactical robotic complex for firefighting, Logistics rescue vehicle, etc)
- 1 Joint training curriculum developed following two common workshops
- 6 Joint training sessions involving 75 experts
- 1 Joint exercise conducted on the field with a participation of at least 150 first responders (simulation of complex situations and real-life emergencies, from wildfires/forest fires to search and rescue missions).
- 4 organisations cooperating across border
