The problem. Project's solution

The Chernivtsi-Suceava region faces low investment in public health infrastructure, outdated equipment, and limited neurosurgica training.

The project addresses these issues by equipping hospitals with modern equipment and technology for emergency neurosurgical care, and organizing specialized training for medical staff. It also fosters long-term cross-border cooperation and builds hospitals' capacity to better respond to medical needs and external challenges in the border region.

- abt. 1,730 persons will benefit annually from the modernised health care facilities
- Endowment of Chernivtsi City Children's Clinical Hospital - Set of trepanation system (craniotome), neuroendoscopic system, Electrohydraulic operating table, operating lamp
- Endowment of Emergency Clinical Hospital Suceava- Ultrasonic dissector, Neuromonitoring device, DrillSystem and Craniotome, 3D C Arm imaging system
- trainings for medical staff covering topics as emergency neurosurgery care of craniocerebral injury, neurosurgical treatment of congenital defects of the spinal cord, etc.
